Plants and Animals	Reproduction: the production of offspring by a sexual or asexual process. Fish: a limbless cold-blooded vertebrate animal with gills and fins living wholly in water Bird: a warm-blooded egg-laying vertebrate animal distinguished by the possession of feathers, wings, a beak Amphibian: a cold-blooded vertebrate animal, that comprises the frogs, toads, newts, salamanders, and caecilians. Reptile: a vertebrate animal, that includes snakes, lizards, crocodiles, turtles, and tortoises. They are distinguished by having a dry scaly skin and typically laying soft-shelled eggs on land. Mammal: a warm-blooded vertebrate, which is distinguished by the possession of hair/fur, females secrete milk for the nourishment of the young, and (typically) the birth of live young. Nectar: a sugary fluid secreted within flowers to encourage pollination Anther: the part of a stamen that contains the pollen Ovary: a female reproductive organ in which ova or eggs are produced Ovule: the part of the ovary of seed plants that contains the female germ cell and after fertilization becomes the seed. Petal: each of the segments of the corolla of a flower Pollen: a fine powdery substance discharged from the male part of a flower. It can fertilize the female ovule. Stigma: where pollen germinates. Style: It is a long, slender stalk that connects the stigma and the ovary. Stamen: the male fertilizing organ of a flower, typically consisting of a pollen-containing anther and a filament.	Life cycle: the series of changes in the life of an organism including reproduction. Embryo: an unborn or unhatched offspring in the process of development Womb: the organ in the lower body of a woman or female mammal where offspring are conceived and in which they gestate before birth Adolescence: the period following the onset of puberty during which a young person develops from a child into an adult. Dispersal: the action or process of distributing or spreading things or people over a wide area. Fertilisation: the action or process of fertilizing an egg or a female animal or plant Metamorphosis: a change of the form or nature of a thing or person into a completely different one Pupa: an insect in its inactive immature form between larva and adult Larva: an insect at the stage of its life after it has developed from an egg and before it changes into its adult form Chrysalis: pupa that is enclosed in a hardened protective case Caterpillar: the larva of a butterfly or moth, which has a segmented wormlike body with three pairs of true legs and several pairs of appendages like legs. Tadpole: larval stage in the life cycle of an amphibian Hatchling: a young animal that has recently emerged from its egg	Birth, growth, reproduction, and death represent the four stages of the life cycle of all animals. Many animals have developed specific parts of the body adapted to survival in a certain environment. Among them are webbed feet, sharp claws, whiskers, sharp teeth, large beaks, wings, and hooves.
